There were 139 cases of sex trafficking reported via the National Human Trafficking Hotline (1-888-373-7888) from SC in 2019. As of December 2020, 75 human trafficking cases were pending in SC State Courts.

Facts About Human Trafficking

- Human trafficking is a form of exploitation where any of the following may apply: the victim is physically forced, the victim is lured under fraudulent conditions, the victim is coerced into actions by manipulation/threat or the victim is a minor.
- Minors (anyone under 18) do not have to prove force, fraud or coercion and cannot consent to commercial sex. Therefore, any sexual exploitation of a minor is considered human trafficking.
- Human trafficking does NOT require transporting a victim from one place to another.
- Human trafficking victims can be any nationality, gender or socioeconomic status.
- Human trafficking victims may be able to leave their traffickers and may appear to live a normal life.
- Even when it appears that someone is participating in prostitution willingly, he/she can also be a victim. Paying the victim does not cancel out or invalidate human trafficking.
- Human traffickers may control their victims by using physical violence, by withholding money or by threatening to reveal secrets to family members to shame the victim.
- Trafficking victims may not realize they are being victimized, they may blame themselves or they may be scared of the potential consequences of leaving.
